The First Word

This little booklet is intended to assist you in finding your class mates of the 1958-1962 era. Some of them are deceased and many are "missing", but the organizing committee for this reunion was able to find contact details for about 160 of them and all those were invited. About ten invitations remain unanswered, which could indicate that we had out-of-date addresses or that people were away from home or deceased. Many who were invited were unable to attend and politely contacted us. Some of those have submitted contact details for publication. But without explicit permission from each person, we are unable to give out contact details, even for people who attended the reunion. Feel free to contact anyone whose details are printed here, as they have agreed to the publication. Also, enjoy reading about their lives since leaving school and their memories of their school-days.

You will also find here *many lists of names*: names of those who attended the reunion, those who sent apologies, and those whom we know to be deceased or who remain "missing". To assist you in recognizing the faces in the class photos on the DVD, there are also lists of names of people in the class groups: the old class photos of 1959 and 1962 and two informal class groups taken in 1959 and 1961; and of course, all the class groups taken on 14 July 2012. Using these lists, you should be able to identify people in all the other photos taken at the reunion. You will also find on the DVD some informal small- group photos that were taken at the 2010 reunion and a couple from reunions in 1986 and 1987. There is also a hotch-potch collection of "snaps" taken between 1958 and 1962 which we screened at the reunion. The old class photos are repeated here. Names have not been provided for these old photos. We recommend that you have this booklet open at the lists of names when you view the DVD.

We hope this booklet will be useful to you and I apologise for any errors it might contain. I have never learned to type and this has been a frightening and very lengthy effort. I have squashed it up a bit to save paper!

In Memoriam

Some of the past students we have contacted have provided obituaries for several of our fellow students who have died. They were displayed at the Reunion and are reproduced here.

☆ MARGARET CASH DAVISON

My name is Bronwyn McKeering. I am a Brisbane friend of Margaret and her family.

My friendship with Marg started more than 50 years ago when we were at primary school at St Agatha's convent in Clayfield, Brisbane. We were the two who spent more time than others outside, being punished for talking in class. Luckily, the punishment did not have the desired effect and we have spent our lives talking, although often from afar.

Margie was the eldest child of Pat and Ethel Cash nee Gordon and lived in Hillcrest Avenue, Wavell Heights, until she married. She arrived at St Agatha's in Grade Four, a bright, bubbly girl with curly red hair and dimples. She was always popular. She was fun. Pat Cash was a successful and highly regarded business man who ran his own printing company, Cranbrook Press. Marg's mum was a loving mother and homemaker who was very sadly taken from her family by breast cancer when only 43 years old. I can clearly remember Mrs Cash at the tuckshop in primary school. Her line was always longer than the others as Marg took all her friends for a treat from her mum. After her mother's death, Margaret became the mother figure to her younger siblings.

We completed our secondary schooling at St Rita's College, and then Marg went to Teachers' Training College. It was during her secondary school years that Margie blossomed socially. She loved people and people loved her. She was very attractive and always the one with the first invitation to a school dance or party. As teenagers we were envious. She did all this while at the same time running the family home very competently. Marg became a primary teacher, popular with both parents and pupils.

In December 1965 Margaret went to Hong Kong for a brief vacation with a friend. It was by sheer chance that Margie met John Bell Davison – the love of her life and her husband for more than forty-one years. John was a Scotsman managing a tea garden in Assam, India, for the Inchcape Group. He was on six months long leave following three years work on the plantation. He had come to Hong Kong to spend Christmas with his sister, Esme, and his parents, who at the time were living there. Marg and John shared one week sightseeing in Hong Kong before Marg returned to Brisbane. The rest, as they say, is history. Late in January, John followed Marg to Brisbane to meet her family. They were married in Brisbane on 4th May 1966, having spent less than four months in each others' company.

The first time I met John he arrived at Marg's family home with a cardboard sign hanging around his neck with "Exhibit Number One" written on it. Marg had asked a group of girls around to meet him and he knew he was up for close inspection. Needless to say, he passed with flying colours. When they married and left their wedding reception to return to Assam, we all thought we would never see Marg again. No one travelled very much in those days and especially not to the high country of India. It has always amazed me that Marg was able to leave family and friends and her home country to go with a man she had only known for such a short time to live in a place she had never seen. That is true love!

Because of conditions in India with the company John worked for, they returned to Brisbane in late December of the same year and John began work with ICI. They built a house in Kenmore and we saw Marg's flare for interior decorating. She was teaching again in Brisbane until Elissa was born, bringing great joy into their lives. Marg had always enjoyed sewing and during these years she became a partner in a children's clothing shop at Indooroopilly. A second child was born, a boy, Lachlan, who sadly was very premature and did not survive. When Kirsty arrived a year later their family was complete. John's career led the family to move to Perth. These were happy years and Marg continued sewing, making small gift lines for ladies, the beginning of their future business, "Lady Like". During this time they had a trip to UK and borrowed a camper van from a friend. They enjoyed this so much that they purchased their own camper van when they returned home, travelling across Australia in it with their little children. Marg was very adaptable and this has been a strength throughout her life.

The family moved to Melbourne and Marg enjoyed visits to old friends and sharing family occasions with them. Marg joined four old school friends for an annual "girls' week". They would take turns organising events and usually went somewhere where they could enjoy talking, cooking, sharing the odd glass or three of wine and walking. Marg added an element of glamour to the bush walks by wearing her beautiful snake skin shoes and pearls.

She added another dimension to the cooking by always producing a cryovaced beef fillet from her designer handbag on arrival. She was honest, with a sense of propriety, and a sense of fun. She was a true friend.

Kerry Duffy was a mate of mine for the two years we were at St Rita's together in sub-Junior A and Junior A 1959/60. Her family had a hotel in Maryborough and I remember going home with her on school holidays. After she left St Rita's, our next contact was not for another 30 years, but it turned out to be very important.

I was nursing in Perth at King Edward Memorial Hospital for Women. One day I received a call from someone asking if I was the Pat Martin who had gone to St Rita's and did I know a Kerry Duffy. The person who phoned was a nurse in the Oncology Day Unit at Sir Charles Gairdner Hospital, only a few blocks away. Kerry, who used her correct name of Kerril by then, had leukaemia. She also had a lovely husband and two gorgeous kids, a boy aged about 12 and a girl of 6 or 7. She had been diagnosed a couple of years before, had been in remission twice but there was to be no third time. By then, Kerry's parents had moved over to live with the family and help with the kids.

Over the next few months I spent a great deal of time with Kerry and her family. She died at home surrounded by her family, me, and two of the Registered Nurses who cared for her at "Charlie's". These nurses had changed their shifts so they could be with Kerry in off-duty time. She was much loved.

I met Carmel Johnson when we started secondary school at St Rita's in 1959. We really became close friends in Sub-senior in 1961 and over the next two years I made quite a few trips to 54 Koala Rd Moorooka on my free (boarder) weekends. I always had a wonderful time there. Her mother was a serene, happy lady and her father was a jovial policeman in the Force in Brisbane. Her brother, Wallace, was a handsome young student at St Laurence's and Mary Therese aged about six, was much younger than her siblings. The family had lost a little boy of four before Mary Therese was born.

Carmel dearly wanted to be a teacher and I think she would have been a good one. Unfortunately, she did not receive a Teacher's Scholarship. She joined the State Government Public Service before her marriage to Greg Rainbow and worked in a mobile chest clinic where TB tests were conducted. Greg, who was a detective in the Police Force in Brisbane, decided to join the Police Force in Western Australia about 1976 and Carmel, their son Gavin born in 1968 and a daughter born in 1972 joined him in W.A. Sadly, Carmel and Gavin's marriage didn't survive. Carmel's sister was already living in W.A. and her parents joined her there, too. These were busy days for Carmel, a single, working parent and we gradually lost touch. I have heard that Carmel and her parents managed a Retreat House for a while.

Carmel always had a quiet strength about her. I remember once attending a school dance, possibly hosted by Nudgee College, on a Friday night. Carmel had not had a pleasant day at school and had been in hot water over recent test results. She had not been looking forward to telling her parents the results and I had half-expected she would not turn up at the dance. But she did, and she looked radiant! I was tactless enough to mention my fears that she would not be there after a rotten day at school. She turned to me and said that there was no point crying at home as that would achieve nothing and that she would just have to try harder. She said that she was determined to pass Senior, and she did. She later told me that Sr Canice wrote a nice letter to her and her parents to congratulate them and said, "Well done, Carmel".

Carmel died in January 2010 of cancer. Her parents had predeceased her but her brother, Wallace, stayed by her bedside for days before her death. He was devastated when she died. Her sister, Mary Therese, and Carmel's children still live in Perth.

† Margaret [Steinbeck] Parkinson

I met Margaret Steinbeck when she arrived at St Rita's from Townsville just before the Junior Exam in 1960. I don't actually remember her being there, and I'm not sure which class she was in, but her name is amongst ours in the Junior Results published in the <u>Courier Mail</u> in January 1961. However, I certainly remember her being in our class in Sub-Senior and Senior.

Margaret was a quiet but confident person, a serious student who enjoyed intellectual challenge and a typical teenage girl with a love of life and a great sense of humour. After Senior she completed the first year of an Arts degree at the University of Queensland and then a year at the Teachers' Training College before embarking on her chosen profession of Secondary School Teaching in 1965. She married another teacher, Bill Parkinson, and over the next ten years they taught in several centres including Maryborough, Gympie, Aspley and Bundamba, where Margaret was appointed History Subject Mistress. They also had three children.

Margaret became active in the Queensland Teachers Union and first gained prominence in 1971 when she, her husband and two other teachers defied authorities and wore Vietnam Moratorium badges into their classes at Gympie High. This brought them national attention when they were the subject of a "Four Corners" program. Margaret was elected to the Executive of the Union in 1976 and served on Executive until her resignation in 1982. She was very highly regarded in the Union and became identified at that time as its leading feminist-activist. On her resignation from the Union she was awarded Life Membership at the age of thirty-eight. Nearly twenty years after leaving school I had met Margaret again in 1981 when I was elected to the State Council of the Teachers' Union. I was alone and very nervous when I walked in to my first Council meeting but Margaret caught sight of me and invited me to sit next to her. She explained everything that happened, pointed out the important people and helped me find my feet. I will never forget that. Margaret's marriage did not last and she moved to New Zealand where she took a position in the Post Primary Teachers Association. She met a new partner and I believe they were on a walking holiday in New Zealand when tragedy struck. I have heard that one of them fell, fully laden with heavy backpack, into a flooded stream, the other dived in to assist and both were drowned. I have tried to contact Margaret's former husband and her daughter for clarification and more information on Margaret's life but have not yet been successful.

Life since school: After leaving St Rita's I went to Kedron Park Teachers' College and my first teaching job was at Mitchelton State School. I worked off my two years' bond then went travelling and working in New Zealand for 6 months with Marlene Brown (one of the Brown twins from school). We did hope to keep going to distant parts but ended up returning to Brisbane and I went teaching in St George. Injune followed that and then I was appointed to Burleigh Heads. I met Robert, my husband, there. His sister, Carolyn Watson-Brown, taught at Burleigh. We then had six children and lived at Townsville and Waterford, then moved into Tarragindi in Brisbane. After Rob retired from Air Traffic Control, we did various things: ran a shop in Tarragindi, managed a pool in Nanango (I also taught there), and managed a caravan park in Hughenden where we met up with Sue Jordan again. While in Hughenden, two of our girls went to boarding school in Brisbane so I went back teaching and had a year at Winton Catholic School. (I always thought of the Winton girls from school as I walked around the place.) We moved back to Townsville where Rob helped our son Donald with the management of Long Tan Pool and I worked for two years on Palm Island. Sister Marion Kingston, a presentation nun, was the principal there. It was a wonderful experience. Then we saw an advertisement for a job at Yirara College in Alice Springs. We both took positions as house parents. I stayed a year and then had a little Homeland school for four years at Red Sand Hill out of Hermannsburg. This was probably the most enjoyable teaching I have ever experienced. Rob and a couple of our daughters were tutors there with me from time to time. After that I did a roving release teaching job, going around various communities in Central Australia. Back to Queensland then where we went to help our daughter, Lisa, when she was having her first child in Middlemount. From there I had a stint at a little school called Clarke Creek with which Rosemary Bowman and her family have great connections. It was a great little school and certainly shows how people in the bush value education and work so hard to get the best for their children. Rob and I then went to Western Australia where we worked at an indigenous Catholic school in the Kimberleys called Ringer Soak. At the moment I am at Katherine Catholic School. Rob and I have enjoyed the various places we have been. We have four lovely grandchildren and Rob is helping with the two older ones in Brisbane as their parents have to go to and from Central Queensland with their jobs. Even if we have been a bit nomadic, I hope that our children have learned a bit more about the indigenous people and have a better understanding of the many issues that need addressing. I am grateful for the opportunities and experiences we have had and thank God that I have had good health. After catching up with so many at the reunion it is great to hear everyone's stories. We all have gone our different ways but we all have that special bond from our time at St Rita's. Over the years I have valued my friendship with Virginia Proh, Lyn Harding, Sue Jordan and Pat Laracy as our lives intertwined at various times and places.

Memories of St Rita's: For many students from country areas, if education was to be continued after Scholarship, a boarding school was the only option. Texas seemed a million miles from anywhere and our transport out was the steam train that seemed to take forever.

My mother was friendly with the Hartigans who owned and ran the Commercial Hotel. They had a residence in Bonney Avenue Clayfield and were familiar with St Rita's so Mum applied and preparations began. We arrived a day late and my first dormitory was in the old building. There were about 10 of us in the big dorm and several smaller rooms on the top floor as well as the nun's area. **Pat Laracy** slept near the door and was always first out of bed and kneeling for our morning prayer when **Sister Conlith** came through to wake us up. We had little dramas with some of the younger ones. **Kathy Higgins** often woke up sick in the night especially after a fete or celebration and we'd have to clean up if she didn't make it to the toilets. Study time was a new routine. External exams were nerve racking -NAPLAN would have nothing on it – as a school's reputation was at stake!!! When I moved over to the big dormitory, I was an early riser so I used to wake people up to study. We used the bathroom and the prime spots were the two bathrooms. A pillow in the bath tub made quite a comfortable spot. One morning my alarm went off and as I slept in

the bed next to **Sister Andrea**'s cubicle, she thought it was hers and was up and down to her morning duties at St Agatha's. She returned as she was one hour early. Needless to say I didn't set the alarm again.

Friendships were formed that have lasted for years. It is also exciting to meet up with pupils not seen since school. Pat Laracy and I remember our free weekends when Miss Noakes would invite us with Margaret for an outing to the Shingle Inn. She was the most lady-like person you could meet and we often think of her kindness and generosity. Our Sporting activities were limited when compared to the boys' schools that competed in the GPS competition. I guess the day girls could join clubs and we did have some great athletes like Sandra Casson the runner and Denise MacRae the swimmer as well as the Steinbeck girls who were well known swimmers. I played tennis and well remember the great prowess of the girls from South East Queensland as well as the great skills of Bronwyn MacDonald and Kath Tynan. Sister Loyola loved her tennis. I was in the D Grade team which was labelled the 'social' team. Thea Coleman was in that as well and we certainly enjoyed our outings. Winning wasn't the top priority. By chance if we could get into Queen Street a treat at Chemist Roush was really a coup. (I remember his "Fruit Cobbler!" Yum!! Ed.) As boarders, we knew the routines of the sisters pretty well. Often they used to walk up and down the driveway in little groups. I guess it was their afternoon relaxation. Sometimes I was called into the nuns' refectory to get the record player working. (I have never been very technical but must have had some skill.)

The nuns had visitors on special feast days and sometimes we would see the black buick which chauffeured **Archbishop Duhig** up the drive and he would distribute welcome iceblocks to the boarders. We knew some of the sisters were studying and only in later life have I realised how brilliant some of them were. The work of **Sister Canice** in India, the great music teaching career of **Sister Marguerite**, the depth of **Mother Veronica**'s knowledge covering so many subject areas and of course the skill of **Sister Jacinta** with Art of Speech are just a couple that come to mind. Anyway, life was not easy for them and I appreciate now their efforts with all of us. Fifty years on it is hard to believe how time has gone. I have been forever grateful that my mother worked so hard to send my sister and me to St Rita's. She was a single mother in a time when there were no benefits and we have learnt to appreciate her even more as we have had our own families and now see our grandchildren facing the many opportunities that are available in an ever changing world.

Memories of St Rita's: I was the fourth member of my family to attend St Rita's College, Clayfield, following my mother, Monica Joyce, and my two sisters, Barbara and Rosemary Bowman. Mum had attended Nundah Convent but turned 13 in February 1926 and possibly was one of the girls who started at St Rita's on its opening day. She did Junior and started Sub-Senior but left to work in her father's accountancy firm. When it was my turn to start secondary school, I was very pleased to have my older sister, Rosemary, still there in the boarding school. Life at St Rita's was quite a challenge after attending a small country state school twenty kilometres outside of Monto. I had to work very hard to keep up with the workload of eight subjects but boarders had set study times each night, except on Saturdays when we were able to watch a film. Television had started in Brisbane in 1959 but there were no TV sets at St Rita's and we were probably lucky not to have to cope with this new distraction.

I always suffered from homesickness, usually only for the first day back each term, but it continued right through to my Senior year! Although possessed of only an average voice, I enjoyed being part of the Boarders' Choir. We sang at weekend Masses and attended practice each Wednesday afternoon. Sr Marguerite was an excellent pianist and conducted the choir exceptionally well. The congregation appreciated our efforts. I loved the Saturday night films and Sr Marguerite very capably handled the projector. We often teased Margaret Young from Longreach and Alice Costello from Windorah who frequently emerged with red eyes from the film night! I also loved Mother Veronica's talks to the boarders on Sunday nights. She was full of wisdom and commonsense and gave us lots of advice for our future lives. She was a wonderful, warm, motherly nun. And I remember Monsignor English quite well. He had a beautiful, cultured voice and gave wonderful homilies. He was very loved in the Clayfield parish. In the early sixties he drove a green, low-slung car. We boarders used to call it "The Frog" for both its colour and its shape.

We boarders always looked forward to our trips home, usually by train unless parents lived close enough to drive to St Rita's. My trip back to school from Monto commenced at 4 p.m. Saturday afternoon and finished at Roma Street station at 7 a.m. on Sunday. I usually travelled with other younger boarders from Monto and Munduberra, but on one occasion I was on my own. I was very weary when the cabbie pulled up and announced we had arrived at St Rita's. We had actually arrived at nearby St Margaret's as I could see by the uniforms worn by several girls, walking across the quadrangle and staring at us in a very curious way! I loved the boarders' "free weekends" once a month when I often went to my grandparents at Holland Park. However, I also gained written permission from my parents to go to the homes of friends from my class. I visited **Helene Moretti**'s aunt and uncle at St Lucia, **Carmel Johnson**'s home at Moorooka and towards the end of Senior year, **Patricia Cutler**'s home at Paddington. On that occasion, we went to the beach with her father and little sister. It was the last weekend before the Senior exams and was a much-needed break. After school finished for us I spent two days with the Cutlers before returning home to Monto. On the whole, I have good memories of my time at St Rita's and have retained several good friends from those days almost fifty years ago. The recent reunion has rekindled many friendships from that time.

Memories of St Rita's: My memories of day-to-day life at St Rita's College start with taking the train, crowded with high school students, from Windsor to Mayne Junction, racing to catch the bus with Maureen Ditton and Janice Evans and then running up the steep hill at St Rita's in the hope that we'd arrive in time. I also remember Maths exam practice on Saturdays in Senior and a special Prefect's meeting in full uniform on one Saturday morning about keeping the rules. Mother Veronica shamed us all with her revealing comment that when challenged about speaking to boys while in school uniform, other students had remonstrated that Prefects were seen holding hands with boys themselves. (There must have been spies on those crowded trains.) I remember reaching the grassed playground for lunch after my first French lesson, exhilarated with the sheer excitement of speaking another language, and my tears of elation as I touched the end of the pool after my only Carnival freestyle swim in Year 11. I also still cherish the copy of I received for winning first prize in English in Year Eight.

Life after school: My omission of a 15-mark question on language in Senior led me to retain my Junior Teaching Scholarship and enter the teaching profession as a Primary school teacher at the tender age of 17. Just as well it was primary, as the high school students would have eaten me alive. I remember borrowing a huge stuffed seagull from the Museum on Gregory Terrace and carting it home on the bus to Windsor for a lesson on birds. At Kedron Park Teachers' College, we were encouraged to take university courses part-time. I studied my beloved French for 2 years, taking public transport to St Lucia after college on Friday nights. My French teacher, speaking in French in second year, was just as scary as Sr Canice. "Mechant! Mechant!" for a score of 6/10 for translation. At college, I indulged myself in modern dance, music, pottery and art and collected a lot of dust on a college bus trip to Ayer's Rock where we broke down on the border of South Australia and had to wait for a replacement bus. I was more than ready to begin my life in the classroom. Fortunately for me, I was sent to Aspley Primary School, travelling with Dianne Sunn from Chermside in her car, as there was no public transport then. I realised years later after my stint in the far west, how wonderful those students were. My attempts to teach recorder were better than my ability to play the instrument. In the year I turned 21, I was sent on country service. I joined a 5-aside basketball team in Charleville, terrified of being bowled over by our larger opponents. I nevertheless managed to teach Grade 3 to sing the French national anthem for their annual concert. Classrooms were freezing. Because of my (limited) university studies, I became a High School teacher in Stanthorpe in charge of the French Department. I watched the snow fall from my classroom in winter. Here, I engrossed myself in theatre - acting, singing and dancing. This was the heart of Sicilian and Italian society and many pleasant evenings were spent singing under the stars among the granite boulders for which Stanthorpe is famous.

A transfer to Caboolture High enabled a move back home and a daily return trip of 80 km north by car. I remember with fondness the students who engaged in my drama group. I married and applied to teach in Sydney. I was given 2 concurrent positions as Patricia Hand, Maths teacher, and Patricia Cummins, French-History teacher at Killara High School in 1970. A gliche in the appointment system had me appointed immediately to Hornsby Girls and then to Chatswood High where I settled as an English-History teacher until I became pregnant and took maternity leave. We girls had been told at Training College that once we got married and became pregnant, we would have to resign from teaching in the Education

Department in Queensland for a higher calling. Fortunately, the Principal of Chatswood High gave me sound advice in defiance of that when I "confessed" to him that indeed I was pregnant and would have to resign. Chatswood was a relatively short trip to Macquarie University which I attended part-time at evening and completed 2 Majors in English and Modern History while teaching and looking after my 2 young children, Jacqueline and Julian. After maternity leave, I was appointed to Maroubra Bay and then for 13 years to Randwick Boys High. There, I edited the school magazine, coached debating and organised multicultural concert evenings. Apart from studying for my BA and then MA in Modern Literature and Linguistics at Macquarie University, and coaching my 6-year-old son's soccer team which played on Saturday mornings, the local amateur musical societies were the mainstay activities for my two children and me. I was in the dance troupe and took leading roles as a mezzo soprano. With threat of forced staff reduction, I volunteered to move and was placed at Sydney Girls High School. There, I took the debating team and selected students from the adjacent Sydney Girls and Boys High Schools to participate in their annual musical production. My daughter had learned ballet and, together, we choreographed the dancing. Joy oh joy, oh rapture! The dragon headmistress had fiddled the figures and we were overstaffed so, as last appointed, I was "invited" to teach at St George Girls High School at Kogarah. While there, I took a postgraduate course in Gifted & Talented Education at University of NSW. As well as my classroom duties in English and History, I volunteered as the extra-curricular co-ordinator for gifted & talented students. I was president of the Gifted & Talented society until 1996 and am now a life member and the local contact person in the Northern Rivers District of NSW.

For 15 years, I organised the single parent ministry at Maroubra Parish and became the State and National President of Solo Parents of Australia. I was invited to join the Australian Social Justice Council as a grassroots member to advise the Australian Bishops on issues such as homelessness, poverty, unemployment and aborigines. I initiated the first church policy on domestic violence in my capacity as chairman of Domestic Issues, introducing the concept of child sexual abuse as an issue. I was invited by Bishop Brennan to organise a seminar on domestic violence in his diocese. I wrote the Prayers of the Faithful and homilies concerning domestic violence for Social Justice Sundays distributed by the bishops for the 6 years I remained on the Council. I had many encouraging talks with Bishop Gerry about the plight of single parents. Some of my best memories of Maroubra Parish were the Saturday night vigil singing with my group of 6 ladies, my solo parent ministry and being given the opportunity to speak from the pulpit about the life of a single parent, scary as it was at the time. I joined the Grail, an international Christian women's social justice movement, about 20 years ago. I had the opportunity to visit Catholic indigenous women in Papua New Guinea, African and indigenous Catholics, as well as study for a diploma in Spiritual Counselling at Ashland Seminary, Cincinatti, Ohio, where the Grail has an international hydroponic farm where women learn a variety of farming skills. I miss the closeness of my contact with these women in Sydney.

I was given a compassionate transfer in 2005 by the NSW Education Department to look after my father in Tweed Heads. I became his carer and retired from teaching to spend more time with him. This was a rewarding and valuable time. Since his passing and reviewing his correspondence, I have grown to admire this man and his contributions to Queensland Surf Life Saving as well as his contributions to installing and maintaining communications within Queensland during the war. I had been invited to join the Lions Club of Maroubra in 2001 and joined the Terranora Lakes Lions when I moved to the Tweed. My major portfolio with the Lions is my conducting of the annual Youth of the Year competition which brings me into contact with contributing senior high school students who are also good public speakers. I have been President at Maroubra and now at Terranora Lakes. In recent years, I have studied energy healing and Arhatic Yoga as a means of maintaining good health and I am now a certified teacher of this modality. I live at Tweed Heads in the house I bought with my father. I have 2 grandsons who live with their father at Montville - Jai, who is good at sport, and Taj, who is artistic and loves acting. Life since school and Memories of St Rita's:

Claire has written two letters, one to her classmates and one to her fellow boarders.

Dear Friends from St Rita's,

I am sorry that I cannot join you in Brisbane today but, as you may already know, I am caring for my brother Garry, who has Parkinson's disease. I have very fond memories of my time at St Rita's and consider myself privileged to have had such an experience. I have often wondered what became of our special group and perhaps today you will find some answers. When we finished our exams, we went our separate ways, not realising that it would be fifty years before we made contact again.

I have spent my time teaching in various high schools and thoroughly enjoyed my interaction with lots of great young people. I was also fortunate enough to enjoy the support and friendship of so many of my colleagues. As a career, I found teaching to be very rewarding, both professionally and personally (even though it could be a little frustrating at times!). When I moved into the regional positions of LOTE Coordinator and then School Support Centre Co-ordinator, I enjoyed the challenge of these roles, but I did miss the direct involvement with students. Eventually, with schools spread over 350 km, it became too much for this "ol' girl" and I decided to call it a day. However, I thought one particular project may be of interest. You will recall the ditty about Latin being a dead language. Well, I have to admit that it was my saviour when I was trying to decipher some Aboriginal languages. Some of the communities which still have strong links to their language and culture, asked me to help them develop formal programs which would encourage their young people to learn more about their heritage while they still had access to the expertise of their elders. To my amazement, I found that the structure of these languages is very similar to Latin. As they say, you should always expect the unexpected. I am still involved in a voluntary capacity in this area and, in collaboration with a well respected elder, have developed a framework for teaching and learning which incorporates the traditional holistic approach to knowledge. It has been a fascinating journey. I am now back on the family farm and am more appreciative than ever of the tranquillity that it offers. Yes, it still rains a lot in Innisfail, but rain is nothing compared to the recent cyclones. The force and the noise of the wind are frightening and we consider ourselves very fortunate to have had only minor damage to our home in both "Larry" and "Yasi". We had considerable damage elsewhere but events like that certainly make you reassess your priorities.

That's enough rambling about how I have filled in the years, so what do I recall about life on the hill at Clayfield? I have so many very fond memories from way back then and many of you are part of them. First of all are the great friendships we formed, the confidences we shared, the happy times and the sad. Then, of course, I will never forget the special bond that existed between the boarders – but that is another story in itself and I'm glad that so many of you have been able to make it to the reunion. Other memories that spring to mind on occasions like this include Mother Aloysius, Sister Canice, Sister Veronica and for the boarders Sister Anita. But apart from the people, how could we forget things like the uniform (brown stockings, gloves and all); YCS activities; and whole school retreats (The nuns probably enjoyed the peace & quiet! Do they still have them?). Then there was the first swimming carnival in the new pool; cleaning our sandshoes with chalk before the house march on sports days; and some of our classmates will remember the day we hid miraculous medals all around the room after Sr Canice had been "harassing" us for a few days. (We survived so it must have worked.) But we did some work as well: what about those little coloured slips for translation every weekend? And oh, let's not forget the inevitable essays (There was always another topic, wasn't there?); and then practice exam papers (but to be fair, the nuns had to mark them: perhaps they had a little whinge occasionally too!); and Saturday morning school and so on.

But life was pretty good really, wasn't it? We were blessed with good friends, good teachers and an environment and tradition to be proud of. So after all these years, I would like to say thanks for those memories and thanks too, to the committee who obviously put so much time and effort into giving us a chance to share them. I have included my contact details at the end of the letter but I just need to clarify my situation re email. For some strange reason, known only to superior beings in the telecommunications industry, I am unable to connect to broadband at home. However, I shouldn't complain, should I, because, if it is fine (and remember, this is Innisfail), and if I go and sit out under a tree in the middle of the yard, and if I line up with the distant tower, I can access mobile broadband. Whoopee!! So you can see why I am reluctant to have my address listed on any data bases or broadcast emails. Seriously though, I get by with dial up for

text emails and go elsewhere if anything else is urgent. So if you have got a few moments, <u>I would love to hear from you</u>. Have a great day.

Memories of St Rita's: My clearest memory of my four years at St Rita's is the panic attached to racing to catch the same tram as **Susan Radford** from Bardon to Adelaide Street and then rushing again for the Alexandra Park Rd bus from the City Hall to Oriel Road every morning. I think we possibly shared that bus ride, either to or from school, with **Clare Fanning, Patricia Toovey, Anne Shuttlewood, Janice Evans, Maureen Ditton, Carmel Riordan and Wendy Lynch.** That trip was followed by the effort of the climb up Hunters Lane with heavy "ports". My memory of our lessons is actually a bit of a blur now, but that journey to school is as clear as if it happened yesterday. It has scarred me for life!

Sr Consilia was our English, French, Maths A, Maths B and Latin teacher in Sub-Junior A. I loved the first two subjects and struggled with the other three. In our first days at school, **Sr Consilia** started us reading A Tale of Two Cities and The Merchant of Venice and I was entranced! But algebra, geometry and Latin grammar were frightening and I dropped Latin. I worried so much about science that I can't really remember who taught us Chemistry and Physics in Sub-Junior and Junior but going to the old Science Lab. was awe-inspiring! Visits to **Sr Marguerite** almost on a daily basis for piano lessons and theory classes in the Convent – beautiful Stanley Hall - provided a haven when maths and science left my brain filled with fog. Even the dreaded scales and arpeggios seemed refreshing and another part of my brain, as well as my fingers and arms, enjoyed the exercise. I actually looked forward to Theory lessons and my fellow students, including **Margaret Cash, Eve Puodziunas and Thea Coleman,** helped to make it enjoyable. I'll never forget that beautiful music room, and waiting on the verandah before my lessons, soaking up the early morning sun while watching planes landing and taking off at Eagle Farm.

I remember our first Retreat, a Redemptorist priest on the stage speaking more eloquently and persuasively than any other person I had heard at that point in my life, and trying hard not to talk to each other for three days. At another time, one of the **Fathers Creed** was urged to sing for us with **Sr Marguerite** accompanying him on the piano. Their rendition of "Jerusalem" left me choked and overcome and to this day I am taken back to that room whenever I hear that song performed. And I remember visiting a Carmelite Monastery in Milton but have no recollection of what we were doing there. However, I clearly remember going home and telling my mother, in deadly earnest, that I was going to become a

Carmelite nun. How my mother kept a straight face I'll never know. (I had a bit of a reputation as a chatterbox.....) Ah, they were strong, emotional experiences, all of them. We were growing up!

It was during our Sub-Senior year that I began to learn the power of a few well-chosen words. One afternoon, possibly during a rare "Free Time", I pulled out of my desk a photo of my grandfather who had been a policeman in New Guinea in 1912-1913. He was such a handsome young fellow, dressed in crisp white uniform with pith helmet and walking stick, standing on the edge of a jungle surrounded by people he described as "fuzzy-wuzzies". Goodness knows why I had it with me! I wrote a note saying, "This is my grandfather" and proudly passed it along to Kathleen Tynan for her admiration. She looked at me, raised her eyebrows, wrote something on the note and passed it back to me. Her message was brief: - "Which one?" I was rendered speechless. I learned two powerful lessons that day: the first, that it's not a good idea to brag, and the second, that a couple of words are often more powerful than many. Thank you, Kathleen. The new pool was a blessing on sticky Brisbane afternoons after school, despite the trauma of dressing and undressing in difficult conditions. But I nearly lost a friend there one day. I was never a swimmer, got out of my depth and when **Susan Radford** tried to help me I nearly drowned her! Her version is that I tried to climb onto her shoulders but I find that difficult to imagine, given that she was so much taller than me. Fifty years later, she frequently makes a point of reminding me of the occasion. I still feel guilty, but it was either her or me and I selfishly chose to save myself! Surprisingly, we are both still alive and still friends. Thank you, Susan. Despite the fact that I was hopeless at all physical activities, I thoroughly enjoyed the hikes that a group of us used to organise to Mt Coottha on holidays. Susan Radford, Janice Evans and Maureen Ditton, Mary Draper, Laurell Smetzer, Helen Feeney and Lorraine Smith were frequent participants. We struggled up the mountain along bush tracks, lit fires and cooked - or burned sausages and were very brave about snakes. Actually, I think we were just late developers, as many of our classmates at that time were going to football games and parties and mixing with boys.

The YCS movement was pretty important to us all. We went on a whole-school YCS picnic to Tamborine Mountain via Cedar Creek Falls in 1962. I remember **Sr Canice** giving us dire warnings about misbehavior on the journey. She concluded by saying, "You never know, I might have to come and sit beside you on the bus." And **Maureen Ditton** raised her hand and asked, "Sister, is that a threat or a promise?" There was a spontaneous intake of breath as the thirty-five other Seniors dared not move. A barely perceptible spasm around her lips slowly became a wide smile and Sister's eyes sparkled. The sigh of relief was palpable. From that day on, Maureen became a hero. She was indeed a brave girl. Another memorable YCS occasion was in the January holidays at the beginning of our Senior year. Several of us attended a Summer School at Stuartholme, which had a reputation for French nuns, well-heeled pupils and excellent manners. **Dianne Sunn, Laurell Smetzer, Kathleen Tynan, Pat Martin and Eve Puodziunas** were some of the participants. As we sat down to lunch in the dining room on the first day, **Mary Carroll** and I were shocked to see grapes being served. "Are we allowed to pick them up in our fingers?" I whispered to Mary. "No, I don't think so," she replied. Not wishing to bring the good name of St Rita's into disrepute, we sat there for ages, delicately eating our grapes with knives and forks. Thank you, Mary. Together we preserved St Rita's reputation and showed the Stuartholme people a thing or two.

I became a boarder in my last term, on Mother Veronica's recommendation. Boarding was less awful than I had feared, largely because I knew it was only for a couple of months, but also because my fellow boarders were good company and we were all very busy before exams. I remember the girl in the bed next to me showing me how to get totally undressed and redressed while still wearing my buttoned brunch coat. That has been a very useful thing to know and I practised the skill in several crowded Youth Hostel dorms in later years. (The ensuing silence indicated that others were very impressed.) Ann Baker was also extremely helpful when it came to the much- needed extra time to study Ancient and Modern History. She must have been an insomniac because she used to wake me around midnight and together we would sneak into the bathroom, cover the window with a towel and each settle into a bath tub with a pillow and a blanket and immerse ourselves in The Romans or Napoleon. Several hours later we would tippy-toe back to bed prior to being roused for morning Mass. My B passes might have been Cs if it hadn't been for Ann Baker, or, on the other hand, they could have been As if I'd had more sleep! Thank you, Ann. On one of our last nights before we left school forever, there really was a midnight feast on the staircase outside the dormitory near the Senior classroom. Someone, Pat Martin or Maurene Dahl, I suspect, organized food and we sat there and ate yummy things and felt very pleased with ourselves for our sneakiness. I guess it might have included all the Senior Boarders, possibly Thea Coleman, Ann Baker, Virginia Bowman, Lyn Ryan, Lynne Allingham, and Pat Fleming. It was the first time I had ever tasted a chocolate éclair and the experience set me on the road to ruin forever. I have remembered that feast every time I've had an éclair in the fifty years since!

In our last two years, **Srs Bernadette and Canice** tried valiantly to teach us trigonometry and calculus and they succeeded, too, but not with me. I dropped Senior Maths. **Srs Jacinta and Canice** exposed us to iambic pentameter, the sonnet, the art of précis and the correct use of the apostrophe, our first Shakespearean tragedy – "King Lear" – and the virtuous Jane Eyre. They also drilled us in irregular French verbs and the delights of <u>Lettres de mon Moulin</u>. **Mother Veronica** intrigued us with descriptions of lapis lazuli, the hanging Gardens of Babylon, the unification of Italy, the United Nations and Sir Garfield Barwick, (or Sir Barfield Garwick: she was never sure...) and most amazingly, taught us logic! (My husband still doesn't believe that I got an A for logic...)

Four whole years flew. One minute we were grappling with poor old Shylock in Venice and fearing for Sidney Carton at the guillotine, and the next we were crying for Lear, exposed to the violence of the storm and his insanity and then rejoicing with Jane Eyre when she finally got her man. And in the meantime, we became women. Many of us lost parents who did not live to see us finish school, and our teachers and our classmates stood beside us and provided love and strength in our grief. I remember that some classmates travelled to Bardon on a cold, wet Saturday, 14 July 1962, to attend my mother's funeral and seeing them there, in the St Rita's uniform, is a memory that has stayed with me when so many others have faded. And then it was all over. We each went off to make our way in life.

They were good years. I never wanted to stay home from school, although the days leading up to piano exams were pretty dire and I *still* have nightmares about going into exams not knowing my scales or not having memorised my pieces! The importance of education was instilled in us and we learned to discipline ourselves and to work hard. We learned to care for and to respect each other, and to care especially about people who were less fortunate than ourselves. We learned about fairness, equality, kindness and faithfulness. We made life-long friends. We had strong, dedicated teachers who taught us to believe in ourselves and to work to achieve our goals in life. I owe much to my old school and am very grateful to my parents that I had the opportunity to be a St Rita's girl.

When I resigned from teaching at St Rita's on the eve of my marriage, I stood on the Convent veranda and the College presented me with a beautiful *Colclough* tea-set. I was stunned, and actually speechless at the time. But every time I use my tea-set, I raise my little cup to my old school.
